A Message from Deacon Rick

In our Mass readings for this weekend, there is a great message in our second reading from St. Paul on the example of the human body to the body of Christ in community. As with the human body, all the parts are needed to realize our full potential. At the same time, if any part is in distress, there is distress in the entire body. Remember the last time you stubbed you toe? Our toe is a small almost insignificant part of our body that helps with our balance, but when it is hurt, it has our full attention. And while it heals, we walk gingerly so not to suffer more pain. All parts of the body are needed to do their part or the entire body suffers. Often we see how we so to speak, shoot ourselves in our own foot because of foolish pride and arrogance against another, not fulling realizing we are hurting ourselves.

All Christians share in this relationship. When Christians are persecuted for their faith, treated as outcasts, mocked, or even martyred as in the Middle East – we all suffer their loss. It doesn't have to be on the other side of the world, it can happen even in our own neighborhood. Christ is the solution to our problems – not the problem as those outside Christianity wish to claim. When we do not act like we are followers of Christ to each other, what message does this send to those who are on the outside looking in? Is it welcoming to those who may be searching? Do our actions build up the body of Christ, or do they tear it down and cause division? Whose loss will it be?

It all starts with each one of us to do our part to support each member of the body of Christ to become all they are capable of being; to welcome them as a member of the family of the body of Christ. If we do that, the blessing of the Lord will be upon us. If we do not, it will be our loss.

In the second reading today, St. Paul speaks of the one body of Christ to which all Christians belong. His comparison of our faith community to a body made up of many parts – with none being less important than another – is a great lesson in how we are to live. Each one of us makes up the whole that God has planned. The eye sees, the hand embraces, the ear hears. But by joining together and sharing our gifts and talents, we achieve far more than if we act alone. St. Paul notes there is to be no division of the body. If one part suffers, all parts suffer with it. If one part is honored, all parts share its joy. When we support and cherish one another we will find joy in the wholeness God intends.
